



NATIONAL MINORITY DONOR AWARENESS DAY FACT SHEET: MULTICULTURAL STATISTICS

DESCRIPTION:

National Minority Donor Awareness Day, celebrated annually on August 1, is a nationwide observance to educate minorities of the desperate need for donation and transplantation within the multicultural community how to designate their decision to **Donate Life**SM. Approximately 53% of those on the national waiting list are minorities. In 2007, 10,752 minority individuals received an organ transplant. There were 2,669 minority deceased donors and 1,851 living donors.

DATE:

August 1, 2008

STATISTICS: Minorities are in desperate need of Minority organ and tissue donors.

- There are more than 50,000 minority individuals registered on the U.S. transplant waiting list.
- Minorities make up 20% of the U.S. population and comprise 53% of individuals on the national organ transplant waiting list. They represent 26% of living and deceased organ donors.
- Anyone can be a potential donor, regardless of age or medical history. A single donor
